SAC KIDS PREPARING TO DELIVER PETITIONS A Major Victory for Grassroots Organizing

SacKidsFirst submitted 38,000 signatures on April 18 to the City Clerk to place a measure on the ballot requiring the city of Sacramento to put 2.5% of its unrestricted funds into children and youth services. This is how both the San Francisco and Oakland children's funds were created. In Sacramento, this will initially be about \$12 Million a year. A coalition of over 22 youth organizations is supporting the measure. The East Bay Asian Youth Center and Youth Forward led the charge!

ALAMEDA COUNTY MOVING AHEAD -A SECOND TRY!

After the excruciatingly close call in June 2018 of the sales tax measure for preschool and childcare, the core group that sponsored the measure vowed to go back to the ballot. Discussions are already underway involving Parent Voices, SEIU, childcare providers, the local community foundation, local government officials and First 5, plus exploratory conversations with a newcomer to the mix, Oakland Children's Hospital. That's one powerful coalition. The group is considering a signature drive, which could open more options about voter threshold needed to pass. It all bodes well

OPEN LETTER TO GOVERNOR NEWSOM

WE LOVE YOU, GOVERNOR NEWSOM! Your

investments in children in your very first budget are historic. During your campaign, you recognized that it would take a combination of state and local resources to achieve your ambitious goals for California's kids. You supported expanding local taxing authority in order to increase resources and local decision-making. We have developed the perfect constitutional amendment proposal to do just that. The amendment would allow local school boards to place general revenue measures on local ballots that would promote the education, health and well-being of children - thus empowering local communities to prioritize their children. The local measures would only require a majority vote, thus ending the 2/3 voter threshold that has prevented the passage of children's measures throughout the state that the majority of voters actually want. We urge you to consider this constitutional amendment as part of a necessary package of reforms to fully meet the needs of the children of California.

IS LA COUNTY READY FOR A CHILDREN AND YOUTH FUND?

LA County has 1/4 of the state's kids, as well as some of the most effective and creative programs and kick-ass organizers in the country. In fact, youth advocates just succeeded in getting the Board of Supervisors to add close to \$30 Million to community-based youth services from state funds normally spent primarily on Probation and law enforcement. BUT, LA County does not have a dedicated children and youth fund. A newly emerging group is taking up the challenge. A Steering committee of a dozen organizations has been meeting to plan initial steps, and on May 21, they are calling together a larger meeting to start the effort. The group is determined that when the Olympics come to LA in 2028, LA will be a model for the state for children and youth funding.

GETTING READY IN LONG BEACH


Lian Cheun, the Executive Director of Khmer Girls in Action, has proven to be a savvy, persistent and deeply committed advocate for a children and youth fund in Long Beach. She has mounted a several year campaign that has included a survey of 750 Long Beach residents, a budget analysis which determined that only 5% of the city budget went to youth programs, a public education campaign about lack of investment in youth, and success in getting a small amount of seed money placed in an official city youth fund. Throughout, it has been young people whose leadership has advanced the cause - and despite disappointments and frustrations with the politics, they did not give up. So now, having gained credibility, momentum and political attention, city officials are coming to her, rather than vice-versa, to identify a feasible permanent and substantial funding stream. This dramatic shift in the city's approach is due, in her opinion, to her coalition drafting its own measure and preparing to place it on the ballot through signatures. After that, the tide turned. Lian anticipates having a measure on the ballot in 2020, probably with the support of city officials!




INVEST IN YOUTH RALLY IN LONG BEACH

LEARNING COMMUNITIES CREATE MOMENTUM

JUVENILE JUSTICE REINVESTMENT NOW IS THE TIME!





The SF Chronicle is on a tear about the ridiculous costs of incarcerating youth in California's local juvenile halls. YIKES - it seems that 39 out of 43 Juvenile Halls in California are less than half full, and some are nearly vacant. The costs of juvenile detention are soaring. In Santa Clara County the annual cost of incarcerating one youth is \$514,000. Think of this as an opportunity to re-prioritize public spending from incarceration to child and youth development - and using the ballot to make it happen. The chaos continues: Thanks to the California Supreme Court

The California Supreme Court's ambiguity about whether a citizen petition for a revenue measure requires a majority or 2/3 vote has certainly caused chaos. No place is this more true than in Oakland. In November 2018, 62% of the electorate voted for a parcel tax to fund childcare and Oakland Promise. At first this seemed like a loss since the City Attorney had written on the ballot that the measure needed a 2/3 vote. BUT since the measure had been placed on the ballot by signatures, the Oakland City Council decided that it could actually validate the result as a win based on various legal interpretations of the California Supreme Court "Upland opinion." However there were objections to the decision and a lawsuit ensured, until finally on April 16, the City Council reversed itself and decided not to collect the tax money after all.
